# **Dubuque's United Nations International Day of Peace**

Again this year, DACU is partnering with the Day of Peace Committee and other area organizations to support **Dubuque's Day of Peace Festival, Sept 10-26.** The **International Day of Peace** group in Dubuque has planned an in-person speaker at Loras College on Tuesday, September 21<sup>st</sup> at 7:00 p.m. CDT. It will also **be livestreamed via Facebook.** 

This year's theme is "Promoting Racial Justice: Dismantling Systemic Racism". The speaker is Olga Segura, opinion and culture editor at NCR, and author of the recent book Birth of a Movement: Black Lives Matter and the Catholic Church. She will speak on "Faith Communities and Liberation."

The United Nations International Day of Peace is recognized around the world every September 21, and Dubuque's Day of Peace Festival each year spans the two week period surrounding that date. We began in 2010 with a single event. Since 2016, the festival has included up to 20 events, with participation from many community groups. Past keynote speakers included Rajmohan Gandhi (grandson of Mohandas K, Gandhi), Rohina Malik (Muslim actress and playwright), Phillip Lawson (early civil rights pioneer), Magdalena Gómez (performance poet and playwright) and Kathy Kelly (activist and writer.)

#### Promoting Racial Justice: Dismantling Systemic Racism

The deaths of George Floyd, Breonna Taylor, and so many others prompted an urgent wake-up call to dignity and equality for all people. The Black Lives Matter movement and systemic racism caused many of us to search for ways to move forward through the discomfort of authentic self-reckoning.



Join us for an evening with this year's keynote speaker Olga Marina Segura, the opinion and culture editor at the National Catholic Reporter and the author of *Birth of a Movement: Black Lives Matter and the Catholic Church.* Her writing has appeared in publications like The Guardian, Revealer, Sojourners, Refinery29, and ZORA Magazine. Her topic: "Faith Communities and Liberation."



# Help us Light the Lantern, with Billie Greenwood

This year's Lighting the Lantern fundraiser will feature the message of an inspiring Presentation associate, Billie Greenwood. Greenwood is a regular volunteer at the U.S. - Mexico border who has brought her knowledge of human rights and passion for service to every hot meal she serves and every lesson she shares with migrant asylum-seekers.

Billie started learning the sounds of the Spanish alphabet at the age of 50. She has spent years studying human rights in Spanish and traveled for 14 years to the U.S.-Mexico border, where she's seen firsthand how the tumult of our national policy has real effect on the human rights of people on the ground.

As our country regains its footing after pandemic shutdowns, we need immigrants more than ever. We need immigrant labor, skills and ingenuity. We need the perseverance and values learned through immigrant experiences.

Billie will headline our fourth annual Lighting the Lantern fundraiser, set for Sunday, Sept. 19 starting at 4:30 p.m. Proceeds will support the Presentation Lantern Center's mission of hospitality, education and advocacy for adult immigrants. This will be the second year that our event will be virtual.

Because we wish to share Billie's uplifting message of hospitality, it will be broadcast via Facebook Live to all who wish to learn more. And because this is also a fundraiser, we ask supporters who are financially able to buy a "seat" at the table for \$90 or a full "table" for \$725--the same amount that an immigrant pays to apply for U.S. citizenship.

Ticket holders will receive a link to participate via Zoom, with additional opportunities to interact and share stories with Billie and other speakers. Their generosity will help us continue our Englishlanguage and citizenship tutoring and services to new Dubuquers for generations to come.

# Saul Flores to Speak September 21

Philanthropist, photojournalist, and motivational speaker Saul Flores will present "With Grit" from 10:45 a.m. to noon Tuesday, Sept. 21, 2021, in John and Alice Butler Hall, Heritage Center on the University of Dubuque campus. The program is free and open to the public.

Through storytelling, discussion, and practical exercises, Flores will explain how students can harness the power of grit to work toward purpose-driven goals. He will help individuals feel empowered to develop gritty habits in their personal, academic, and professional lives. Flores also will share with students how grit can be a tool for navigating the college journey.

Nationally recognized for his social impact projects, Flores learned the power of grit at an early age as a first-generation college student born into a family of sugarcane workers. His mother juggled multiple jobs upon arriving in America and his grandmother traded aluminum cans for coins to provide for Flores and his family. From experiencing personal hardship to navigating how to get into college, grit became key in Flores' journey to achieving his goals.

Flores is the storyteller of the inspirational journey "The Walk of the Immigrants." He walked 5,328 miles through 10 countries to document the journey immigrants take to the United States and to fundraise for an elementary school in his mother's hometown in Mexico. His work has been featured on National Public Radio, MSNBC, and TEDEX. Flores has been as a keynote speaker for dozens of universities, inspiring audiences through his visual presentations in which he helps people realize the capacity of their immense human potential given times of extreme adversity.

# **Health Care for Kids!**

Even when life is a little uncertain, kids still need to see their doctor for routine care. Routine well-child visits help pediatricians determine if kids are meeting important developmental milestones and give ageappropriate immunizations. Families should contact their health care provider and schedule an appointment to catch up on missed visits and vaccinations. Many uninsured children may be eligible for free or lowcost health insurance through Medicaid and the Children's Health Insurance Program (Hawki). Eligibility is dependent on household size and income. A family of 4 earning up to \$80, 030/ year may qualify for Hawki. For children and teens, age 0-18, routine care including check-ups, vaccines, dental cleanings, and eye exams are covered. Enrollment in Medicaid and Hawki is open year- round.
