DUBUQUE RESCUE MISSION

The Dubuque Rescue Mission continues to faithfully serve dozens of men every day, giving those facing housing insecurity a place to stay warm, clean, and fed (breakfast, lunch and supper is served). We have been housing men at our 398 Main Street building and St. John's Lutheran Church.

Hope House and our four Transitional Houses host men who are working full-time and live there. Not only that, but we continue to creatively work with the men to re-enter the workforce and engage with stable housing through other programs like the Bicycle Repair Shop, Mission Gardens, and our partnership with the New Hope Catholic Worker farm.

Most recently, we have embarked on a remodel of our bathroom facilities which will allow us to provide hygiene opportunities for our residents in a dignified manner. The remodeling has required us to shift some of the sleeping arrangements and hold our DRM Board meetings online; but the results will be worth the wait!

The DRM could not do what we do without your support. We do not receive any government funding, and rely completely on congregations and organizations in the community to serve our clients. We are always in need of good, lightly used furniture and household items such as laundry detergent, twin bed sheets, bath towels, and washcloths. Your prayers and volunteer support are essential as well.




MEXICAN-AMERICAN MULTICULTURAL DINNER & MOVIE

MANY FAMILIES IN THE COMMUNITY STRUGGLE TO PAY HIGH PREMIUMS FOR HEALTH AND DENTAL COVERAGE.

- Hawki insurance provides health and dental coverage for children up to the age of 18 who do not financially qualify for Medicaid, but may meet other income guidelines.
- Guidelines are based on household size and income, and many working families may qualify. For example, a family of 4 can make up to \$80,030/year and qualify for Hawki coverage.
- Cristee' Miner is the new Hawki Outreach Coordinator for the VNA and is ready to assist with questions or the application process.
- Hawki premiums continue to be waived, and disenrollments are no longer in effect while the public health emergency is in place.
